

This is an annual event to give appreciation to our teachers (in service or retired) who have been with us for at least 15 years, to thank them for their contributions to our schools in nurturing generations of Fairsians. It is also a platform for the teachers to meet each other and catch up.

After the invitations were sent out, the response was quite good and about 60 teachers attended. The food was sumptuous and was quite a wide spread. Not just the fresh seafood, the deserts were aplenty and diners were spoilt for choice.

Among the retired teachers, we are honoured to have our current Principal from FMS(P), Mrs Soh Mei Foong as well as our Schools' Board of Management Chairperson, Mrs Joni Ong present with us along with 2 of our former Principals, Ms Dorothy Ho (FMSP) and Ms

Elaine Lim (FMSS). Other notable mentions was, Mrs Lyuo Shao Mei who attended last year as well. Mrs Lyuo graduated from Fairfield Girls in 1956 and then came back to her alma mater to teach mathematics between 1962 to 1997.

All praise and honour be to God for the past 137 years and may the legacy of Fairfield live on, May God continue to bless Fairfield always.















Fond Memories of The Fairfield Red Cross Unit, Serving One Another

The Fairfield Red Cross Unit marked its end in March 2025. The Red Cross was one of the longest running CCAs in Fairfield discontinued due to dwindling student enrolment. The Primary School unit closed in December 2024 and Secondary School Unit closed in March 2025.

The story began in 1952, when the Red Cross Link was established at Fairfield Girls' School with the help of music teacher Mrs Elsie Lee Swee Cheng who had assisted the Chief Representative of the British Red Cross for the Far East (Miss Teresa Spens) to start Red Cross Links in Singapore. Like the Girls Brigade, the Red Cross was set up with Junior and Senior Units.

The first meeting of the Fairfield Red Cross was held on 21 March 1952. The motto was "Serve one another" and this motto has remained throughout its existence.

Red Cross members learned marching and drills, other than first aid skills. There would be activities like quizzes, talent times and hikes.

In the 1950s, to serve the community, the girls made stuffed toys, scrap books and frocks for the under privileged children, while the senior girls prepared articles for the international album to send overseas. Other activities to serve the community included visits to the old people club at Wesley Hall and helping out with crippled children outing at Katong Park.

In 1962, the red cross members started the red cross Hospital and Library Service in the Singapore General Hospital which was near Neil Road. It lasted to 1969.

In the 1970s, the teachers who made a mark were Mrs Eileen Chua, Mrs Neo Kah Lee and Mrs Iris Kee who helmed the red cross for more than a decade. In 1971, The Red Cross took part in the inter-school Red Cross Debate for the first time. The Red Cross debate team took down big names like Raffles Institute and Tajong Katong Girl's School and came in second overall in the inter-school Red Cross Debate. In 1972, it was first recorded that the Red Cross took part in Singapore Youth Festival (SYF).

Also In 1972, monthly assessments were started for cadets to ensure that they had learnt all that has been taught. As time went by, the programme was further developed and used to spot future leaders of the Unit.

The Fairfield Red Cross Unit marked its end in March 2025. The Red Cross was one for example obtaining Gold in the 2019 competition.

In 1983, with the schools separating into primary and secondary, the Fairfield Primary Red Cross unit was formed replacing the Junior Unit. In 1984, the chairman of the Secondary Red Cross was student Miss Yeo Li Li. She would later return as a teacher-in-charge to helm the Red Cross from 1996 to 2005. In the 1990s after the opening of the school extension at FMSS, the red cross had its own room facing the school field, where the current general office is.

The Fairfield Red Cross Youth Unit specialised in first aid and evacuation knowledge. Besides learning first aid, foot drill, evacuation, the unit members learnt outdoor survival skills in cooking, campcraft etc. There were also activities to serve the community like the Project Red Cross Love and home visits to the homes of the elderly such as St Andrew's Nursing Home. Members also engaged in environmental efforts, including litter picking, recycling projects, and other green initiatives. The Unit maintained high standards of excellence, attaining the Excellent Unit Gold Award (EUA) from 2022 to 2024.

Red cross members who graduated from school came back to serve the unit, long after they graduated. This was in the form of the Volunteer Instructor Programme.

The Fairfield Red Cross left a huge impression on Fairfield students. Members who joined and left would have many fond memories of working as a team, learning self-discipline, and sharpening their first aids skills - skills which have proved useful later in life.

TRIPS FOR INTERNATIONAL EXPERIENCE (TIE) - CHIANG MAI 2024

24 Primary Four student leaders embarked on their first international learning journey to Thailand from 4 – 8 November in 2024, the first of its kind since the COVID-19 pandemic. This inaugural cultural immersion experience was specially designed for our P4 Student Leaders (Peer Supporters, Class Monitors, and Sports CCA Leaders) to deepen their understanding of one of Singapore's closest neighbours through meaningful interactions with students from Phrao, Chiang Mai.

The trip aimed to:


- deepen in students the 21st Century Competencies (21CC) of global and cross-cultural literacy and sensitivities
- expose students to Thailand and sensitise them to Singapore and its place in the world

Led by Year Head, Mrs Chua Wei Wei, and supported by a dedicated team of five teachers, the students planned and conducted various interesting activities such as English Language and sports lessons for their Primary 1 and 2 counterparts in Little Candles Methodist Primary School in a little village located 2 hours away from Chiang Mai. Despite some language barriers, the students from Little Candles enjoyed all the lessons planned for them tremendously. Our students were equally enriched by the lessons conducted by teachers of Little Candles Methodist Primary School as well as church volunteers from the Lisu tribe who hailed from the villages in the surrounding mountains of Phrao.

Beyond the classroom, the students also enjoyed hands-on learning experiences, such as making eco-friendly paper from elephant poo at The Elephant Poopoopaper Park. A visit to the Chiang Mai City and Arts Cultural Centre helped to contextualise all the learning and broaden their worldview.

Back in school, our young ambassadors translated their insights into assembly presentations, sharing their learning and reflections with the wider student community - inspiring their peers with stories of crosscultural friendship, resilience and gratitude.

We are excited to welcome our new Vice-Principal, Mr Tony Kng to Fairfield Methodist School (Primary)! He is very friendly and enjoys interacting with students.

In this interview, he shares about his previous work before coming to Fairfield, his favourite subject and what he enjoys most about being a Vice-Principal. He also talks about his hopes for all Fairsians and tells us about his hobbies and exploring different kinds of food.

We hope you enjoy learning more about him!

What was the previous programme or school you were in before coming to Fairfield?

Before joining Fairfield, I was with the Ministry of Education, in the Educational Technology Division. I joined the Media Design for Learning branch, where our focus was to design and produce digital media content to support curriculum, pedagogy, assessment, professional development, events and communications.

What is your favourite subject?

My favourite subject is the Chinese Language. Growing up in a Chinese-speaking household, the language came naturally to me—it was the primary medium of communication at home. This strong foundation not only deepened my appreciation for the language but also inspired me to begin my career in education as a Chinese Language teacher when I first joined MOE.

What do you like about being a Vice-Principal?

What I enjoy most about being a Vice-Principal is the opportunity to connect with students across the entire school. I make it a point to engage with them during recess, listening to their thoughts, learning about their interests, and simply getting to know them better. These interactions are often the most meaningful part of my day—they remind me of why I chose to be in education.

What are your aspirations for students of FMS(P)?

My hope is for every Fairsian to grow into a person of strong character. Integrity is something I value deeply—it's also one of MOE's core values. I want our students to be honest, to stand by their words, and to do what's right even when no one is watching. While academic achievement is important, I believe that character development is just as important—if not more.

I also like to remind students about the 3Cs: take Care of yourself take Care of one another, and take Care of the environment—this includes our school, our nation, and the world we live in. I hope Fairsians will not only support their friends, but also show

care and appreciation for their teachers. Fairfield is more than just a school; it's a big family. And in this family, we grow together with kindness, respect, and a shared sense of responsibility.

What do you do in your spare time? What are your hobbies?

I love to swim—it's something I do almost every day. On average, I swim about 30 to 40 laps each session. I first picked it up around three to four years ago as a way to lose weight, and over time, it's become a daily habit and hobby. In fact, I lost about 20 kilograms through this routine.

Now, if the weather is good and I miss a swim, it feels like something is missing from my day. Some people might find swimming repetitive, but I've found a way to make it enjoyable. I use waterproof earpieces to listen to music while swimming. It really helps me unwind and gives me an hour to clear my mind and take a break from work.

You mentioned that you listen to music while swimming. What kind of music do you listen to, and what's your current earworm?

I enjoy a wide range of music—English, Chinese, even Cantonese—basically anything that catches my ear. I often discover new songs while listening to the radio, and if something stands out, I'll download it and add it to my playlist. My sons also introduce me to songs they think I might like, which helps keep my playlist fresh and interesting.

What is your favourite food?

I enjoy all kinds of food and love exploring different cuisines. Living near the East, I often find myself at Bedok Hawker Centre, which offers a great variety. I'm quite adventurous when it comes to food and don't mind travelling long distances just to try something new. Over the years, I've tasted some rather exotic dishes, including barbecued porcupine, curried fruit bat, donkey meat, raw horse sashimi, and raw octopus. For me, food is about exploration and discovery!
